Better GT.M support by VistA when running on GT.M systems on Linux, macOS or Cygwin x32.

IMPORTANT: THIS PATCH WILL CHANGE YOUR BOX NAME. IT WILL STOP TASKMAN, RENAME THE LAST ENTRY IN 14.7, AND THEN START IT AGAIN. IF YOU HAVE MORE THAN ONE ENTRY, YOU WILL NEED TO CHANGE IT MANUALLY. Box name is now obtained from GT.M environment variable gtm_sysid.

Before you install, you need to know that GT.M uses the following *nix shell utilities: lsof , ps , awk (Cygwin only), openssl , shasum , xxd , base64 , dig , ipcs (Linux only), rm , mv , wc , grep (Cygwin only), stat (Unit Tests only).

Pre-Install does the following: Stop Taskman

Post-Install does the following: Rename % routines, rename ZUGTM to ZU, rename Taskman Site Parameter (14.7), and start Taskman.

There are no end-user facing changes with the exception of ^ZSY: It doesn't print closed or principal devices anymore.

Fixes issues [#1](#), [#2](#), [#5](#), [#8](#).

Cygwin x32 specific notes: Most utilities that look for current processes grab the ones accessing the current database; with Cygwin, since we don't have programs that can do that, we just get every M process on the system.

It's provided in the form of a KIDS build for existing GT.M systems or a zip files of .m files for new installations that can't use KIDS yet.

Here's a transcript of a KIDS install, so that you would know what to expect. The KIDS fie was saved in the /tmp/ directory which was defined as the PRIMARY HFS DIRECTORY .

Developer Notes

The build suppresses compilation warnings by default. If you wish to see compilation warnings when developing or installing KIDS builds when routines are saved using `^%ZOSF("SAVE")`, set `^%ZOSF("COMPILEWARNING")` to 1.

Change Log

PLEASE NOTE: UNLESS OTHERWISE SPECIFIED, ALL NEW FEATURES REQUIRE GT.M 6.0-000 OR HIGHER! GT.M 6.0-000 was released on 27 October 2014. No bug fixes will be provided for those running an older version of GT.M. Authors are noted in parentheses.

XLFIPIV (C Edwards)

GT.M IPv6 Support (mainly checks GT.M version and env var `gtm_ipv4_only`). Previously, only Cache. GT.M added IPv6 support in version 6.0-003.

XLFNLSLK (C Edwards)

GT.M IPv6 Lookup implementation using `dig`. Previously, only Cache.

XQ82 (S Habel)

Replacement of M95 `^$JOB` with `$ZGETJPI(%J,"ISPROCALIVE)` for GT.M. Cache still checks `$D(^$JOB(%J))`. Previously, the `^$J` code wasn't even checked for GT.M as it was recognized that GT.M does not have it.

XUSHSH (S Habel)

Implementation of redacted code, but only for GT.M. I don't have access to the Cache source code from the VA. Previously, all entry points were empty.

- SHAHASH implemented for GT.M using `shasum`. Conversion to base64 done using `xxd` to get the binary from the hex value and then `base64` to encode it.
- B64ENCD & B64DECD implemented using `base64`
- RSAENCR & RSADECR implemented using `openssl pkeyutl`
- AESENCR & AESDECR implemented using `openssl enc -e/-d -aes-256-cbc`

ZISHGUX (%ZISH) (previously ZISHGTM) (S Habel)

Many changes throughout routine.

OPEN re-implemented:

- Default is now `STREAM:NOWRAP`, not `VARIABLE:WRAP`, which was the previous default. (Actually, it's the GT.M default; and thus inherited.)
- GT.M does not support `WIDTH` as an open time parameter. Only with `Use`. `WIDTH` uses replaced with `RECORDSIZE`.
- Reads with `Width` specified that would normally be `STREAM:NOWRAP` are changed to `VARIABLE:NOWRAP:RECORDSIZE=#`.
- Binary reads are still `FIXED:NOWRAP:RECORDSIZE=#`. That has not changed, except for removing the hardcoded recordsize if width is specified. If `WIDTH` isn't specified, then the default `RECORDSIZE` for binary reads will be 512 bytes.

`$$DEL1` entry point added. Previously it only existed in `ZISHONT`. Used by KIDS.

\$\$MV uses a pipe rather than ZSY, which was used previously.

CD PEP/SR added.

\$\$PWD now works. It previously never worked.

\$\$DEFDIR now will crash if given a bad directory. Previously, it returned '/' when given a bad directory, which was a bad bug, as that means the root directory. We can't return an empty string, because that will be interpreted by GT.M as no directory, and therefore, a write/read will happen in the current directory, which is not what a programmer will want. Crashing is the best option here.

\$\$QS^DDBRAP and \$\$QL^DDBRAP (!!!) replaced with \$QS and \$QL

\$\$READNXT will not apply global overflows during reads unless the read line overflows the global's maximum record size. Previously, overflows happened on any line longer than 255 character. Record size is determined using \$VIEW on the specific global following by a call to ^%DSEWRAP.

\$\$GTF had a bug where it stopped early if a global wasn't strictly following an ascending cardinal numeric orders (1, 2, 3, 4). This is now fixed. I have some concerns that the new algorithm may be slower, but this remains to be seen.

ZISTCPS (%ZISTCP) (S Habiël)

Implementation of a Multi-process Server in GT.M. Requires GT.M 6.1.

ZOSV2GTM (%ZOSV2) (S Habiël, KS Bhaskar)

SAVE:

- Open parameters are now NEWVERSION:NOWRAP:STREAM; previously they were newversion:noreadonly:blocksize=2048:recordsize=2044.
- No tabs are added if they are not in the original source code. Previously, tabs were always added, in violation of all M standards.
- ZLINK suppresses compilation errors now. Previously, it didn't.

DEL: Completely rewritten to recursively delete all routines with the specified name from all GT.M directories. Object files are deleted too; and the current process is given a fake empty routine in order to evict the one in the current process's image. Previous version was much more primitive.

LOAD and LOAD2: Avoid using \$INCREMENT as using it with globals results in unpredictable subscripts upon multiple invocation. Previously used \$INCREMENT.

TEST: Reimplemented to use SILENT^%RSEL(RN). Previously used a different algorithm that doesn't account for multiple directories.

ZOSVGUX (%ZOSV) (C Edwards, KS Bhaskar, S Habiël)

\$\$ACTJ on Linux uses `ipcs -mi` on the output of `mupip ftok` to return the number of processes attached to the shared memory segment accessed by the default segment of the database. On macOS, since `ipcs` doesn't support similar functionality, it uses `lsof -t` to count the number of processes accessing the default segment. Cygwin uses `ps` due to the lack of any other methods. The result is cached for one hour. In that hour, we rely on VistA's XUSCNT mechanism to keep track of the number of processes. Previously; ZSYSTEM with "`ps cef -C mumps|wc`" onto a file on disk, which was then read back; was used.

\$\$RTNDIR is very reliable now. Previously, a whole host of conditions can make it fail.

\$\$TEMP has not been updated with a Kernel Patch released a few years ago that changed the "DEV" node in KSP (8989.3) to be 2 pieced. Now this is fixed.

JOBPAR reads from `/proc/$J/comm` rather than use `ps`. NB: Won't work on macOS.

DOLRO was optimized by removing the \$DATA check, which is not necessary when the system just told you that a local variable exists. Another faster algorithm, which has not been extensively tested, is in the comments after DOLRO. Experiments show that the difference between the two algorithms is about 6ms.

GETENV %HOST (Box Name) is now obtained from the environment variable `gtm_sysid`. Previously, it got the hostname from the operating system. This caused several problems: many machines change their hostnames dynamically; and making a hostname call is expensive for this frequently called API.

\$\$VERSION API was fixed to correctly return the version number if 0 or nothing is passed in, and the operating system if 1 is passed in. Like this:

T0, T1, ZHDIF are implemented if you have GT.M greater than v6.2 or you have the GT.M POSIX plug-in installed. To be honest, I never tested that logic with the plugin.

DEVOPN was modified to remove CLOSED devices, which ZSHOW "D" keeps.

\$\$RETURN is now a public API, and it uses a pipe rather than ZSY and then a read back. A crucial bug that hit multiple users, where the device was closed, did not return control to the last opened device in IO, resulting in some CPRS crashes when code won't write to the NULL device anymore. \$\$RETURN also allows you to ask whether the command succeeded, rather than what the output is, by passing in a second parameter: Passing this in, you will get the output of \$ZCLOSE. \$ZCLOSE was added to GT.M 6.1. The \$ZCLOSE is not guarded by a version check, since I am hoping that people who use it will specify the minimum version of their software. \$\$RETURN is called by %ZISH, XLFNLSLK, and XUSHSH.

STRIPCR has been removed. It was not a public API, and was not used in my time in the VistA community--which prefers the Utility `dos2unix`. And in any case, GT.M will support CR's in routines in the next release.

ZSY & ZUGTM (ZU) (KS Bhaskar, S Habel)

ZSY was extensively modified:

- New JOBEXAM section called by ZU; in order to make maintenance of the code easier.
- All VMS entry points removed.
- Support for \$ZMODE (Interactive process vs Background Process)
- CLOSED devices, \$PRINCIPAL, and the ps command are not shown as open devices in the process listing. Previously all devices showed up.
- Removal of Paging. I am sure most people today don't use dumb terminal emulators.
- Now, only processes accessing the current database are shown; rather than every single M process on the system in which we are running.
- Interrupt is done using signal 10 (Linux) or signal 30 (macOS, Cygwin) against all processes reported by lsof to be accessing the current default segment of the database. Previously, all mumps processes were interrupted. Cygwin interrupts all processes since we don't have the ability to grab the ones that are accessing the current database.
- Calls to ps with pids to get other process' information are chunked together in order to provide speed when calling ps. The chunks are not larger than 970 characters each, in order to accomodate the maximum GT.M pipe length of 1023.
- Interrupts were done while collecting and printing the data. They have now been moved to INTRPT(%J) and INTRPTALL(.procs). The latter returns to you the list of processes interrupted, and as such is killing two birds with one stone.
- HALTALL is a new entry point that gracefully exits VistA processes by calling a cleanup routine in XUSCLEAN and then calling HALT^ZU.
- HALTONE is a new entry point that does the same thing but just for one job.

ZUGTM: JOBEXAM calls NTRUPT^ZSY (Lloyd Milligan's ZSY), or if not, tries JOBEXAM^ZSY. If neither of these are present, it will run a default interrupt.

ZTLOAD1 (C Edwards)

TSTART and TCOMMIT do not comply with the M standard; and have been removed as GT.M, which implements the M standard in Transaction Processing, did not accept them.

ZTM6 (C Edwards)

Same as ZTLOAD1.

ZTMGRSET (C Edwards and S Habel)

Maximum patch number changed from 999 to 9999999.

%ZISH routine is now ZISHGUX; previously it was ZISHGTM.

COPY uses OPEN, ZPRINT, and CLOSE, rather than the "cp" command. ZLINK in COPY suppresses compilation errors. ZLINK's effect on \$ZSOURCE is undone so that your previous \$ZSOURCE stays as it is.

\$\$R fixed for GT.M.



Unit Tests (C Edwards and S Habel)

EVERY SINGLE CHANGE HAS A UNIT TEST, except ZTM6, which deals with load balancers, which GT.M cannot use.

Routines are ZOSVGUT1 and ZOSVGUT2. D ^ZOSVGUT1 is the entry point. Coverage calculations can be done by running COV^ZOSVGUT1. Note that it uses a modified M-Unit that can accommodate a passed by reference list of routines.
